



## Dennis Donald: Creating Deadwood on Bonsai Anson B. Nixon Park, Kennett Square, PA – Pavillion 1 Saturday, September 20<sup>th</sup>, 2014, 10:00

Dennis's presentation will focus on several techniques for creating deadwood on bonsai that will show as few "man-made" influences as possible. Some power tools will be demonstrated. He has included a selection of web sites that should allow you to find all you will ever need to know about creating deadwood on bonsai that looks natural. They all have additional links to a multitude of other sites. As noted, he will also be examining some of the power tools that can be used to facilitate large scale projects – but on a very limited duration -- just enough to show the types and their potential.

### Longwood Show

The Longwood Show is scheduled one week earlier than in the past, October 25-26. The Longwood Gardens BBS Bonsai and Ameriseki Show challenges our members to put on another demonstration of the remarkable styling skills of our club.

The sign-up forms are distributed with this email. Please sign up no later than October 18.

We especially need tree and stone sitters. Members not showing are encouraged to spend a part of the day helping with security. You will likely be asked more than a few questions where you can share your expertise with the patrons. It's a very rewarding experience. You

also get the opportunity to see other members' works of botanical art and viewing stones. Sitters are free to tour the grounds when off-duty.

We also need three demonstration speakers, Saturday at 12:00 pm and 4:00 pm, and Sunday at 2:00 pm.

Boxwood, fragrant sweet box, mums and pachysandra are restricted plants and not allowed on the Longwood Gardens grounds.

You may set up on Friday, October 24, from 1:30 to 4:00 pm. Set-up on Saturday begins at 7:15 am.

Enter through the Business Gate on Conservatory Road on the back side of Longwood Gardens. Drop-off is behind the conservatory gallery/galley entrance. Park on the left side of the driveway (*so that cars can continue to pass on the right side*), drop off your trees or stones, then move your car to the larger employee parking lot.

The show closes at 6:00 pm on Sunday.
